### **VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN IN LONDON**

#### **EVAW launches a report on VAW prevention**

The End Violence Against Women Coalition (EVAW) has launched a report, "A different world is possible", calling for the government, local authorities, public bodies and schools to take action to prevent violence against women and girls before it begins.

The report which also showcased 15 pioneering violence against women and girls prevention projects, called for:

- Education Secretary Michael Gove to tell all schools ending abuse is a national priority.
- Head teachers to take a 'whole school approach' - eradicate sexist behaviour, promote a culture of respect
- Sexual consent, healthy relationships and gender stereotype should be part of the statutory National Curriculum
- Schools should link in to specialist women's services in the community to ensure young people get support
- Councils and Central Government should fund public campaigns and support services

Marai Larasi, co-chair of the Coalition, said: “Despite the alarming scale of violence against women and girls in this country – up to 3 million women experience some form of abuse every year - we have stopped asking the question of how we can prevent it from happening in the first place. It’s as if we accept it as a fact of life. It is not.

“Schools are a critical actor. Our poll found that one in three girls have experienced unwanted sexual touching in UK schools – it is clear the issue is alive in school environments. Schools must tackle attitudes that normalise violence and abuse by exploring gender stereotypes, respect, equality and consent with young people.”

### **Single mothers hit hardest by welfare changes, say report**

Single mothers would be hit hardest by welfare changes, revealed a new research by the Fawcett Society and the Institute for Fiscal Studies on the impact of tax and benefit changes on men and women.

The report, “Single Mothers: Singled Out - the impact of 2010-15 tax and benefit changes on women and men” considered all tax and benefits reforms to be introduced during this period and concludes that single women will lose more than other households as a result of the cuts.

It adds single mothers can expect to lose 8.5% of their net annual income by 2015 more than a month’s income each year.

Anna Bird, Acting Chief Executive of the Fawcett Society said: “During our court case, the government insisted that assessing how cuts impact differently on women and men in any meaningful way wasn’t possible; this research shows it can be done.

“Had the Treasury been doing this research in the first place, single mothers might now not be facing a situation where they can’t afford childcare and so can’t work, and where some of the poorest women in our society are right now getting poorer.

“We’ve looked at each of the tax and welfare changes in turn, considered how different households will be affected by them, and calculated what the impact will be on different groups’ incomes.

“The results are clear: women are bearing the brunt of cuts. Single women, on average, are set to lose a greater proportion of their income than other households, such as single men or couple households.

“In part this is because women are typically poorer than men, but it is also because women make up the vast majority of lone parents – and it is this group that are set to lose most under the reforms. Lone mothers can expect to lose the equivalent of one month’s income a year by the time all the cuts are implemented.

“A year on from the Coalition Government’s first budget, we call on the Chancellor to adopt this analysis in future budgets to allow for fairer and more transparent decision-making. The government should also review welfare, employment and childcare policy, so that lone mothers do not shoulder more than their fair share of cuts.”

### **Man allegedly stabbed his wife to death**

Farrukh Malik, a 65-year-old man from Finchley London, is alleged to have stabbed his wife Sarwat Malik, 60, to death in front of their horrified daughter-in-law.

A Scotland Yard spokesman confirmed: "A murder investigation is under way following the death of a woman in Finchley. Officers found a woman, aged 60, suffering multiple stab wounds. Paramedics and a helicopter ambulance also attended and the woman was pronounced dead at the scene."

A neighbour said: "It's being claimed that the husband stabbed his wife while the daughter-in-law was in the room, so she saw it all.

I saw her outside later when the police and ambulance came. She looked like she still had her night clothes on, like she hadn't got dressed yet. She definitely looked shaken."

### **Asylum seeker deported amidst rape investigation**

A Nigerian woman asylum seeker was deported amidst ongoing investigation into allegations she was raped.

Andrew Smith, MP for Oxford East, had called on the Home Office to suspend her deportation until the investigation was over.

He said: "The handling of this case is a cause for concern. It's a very sad story. We all accept that if people are in breach of immigration rules, then they can immediately face being sent back.

"But in her case, she said she had been trafficked here, she had not properly had the chance to put her legal case forward and she said she had been the victim of a rape."

According to the police a man was arrested after the allegation and he has been released on bail until July 11.

Rebecca Webber, a spokesperson of Thames Valley Police said: "If any charges are brought or it is deemed necessary for the investigation, arrangements will be made to facilitate her return to the UK."

However a spokesman from the UK Border Agency said: "There is no legal basis for her to remain in the UK and therefore removal is appropriate."

Sian Evans, from Women Against Rape, said: "We think this is a complete scandal. Whatever the outcome, she should have been allowed to stay until justice was done.

"The woman rang a colleague as she was being taken to the plane and said it was like she was being taken to her death. She was weeping and completely broke down."

### **Reported sex attacks increase while conviction decreases**

According to figures released by Devon and Cornwall Police, the number of rapes and serious sexual offences reported has risen by about 40% in three years, while convictions have gone down by 30% since 2008.

Detective Chief Inspector Dave Thorn, from Devon and Cornwall Police, said: "It is very difficult to say, definitively, what the reason is. The fact that people are feeling more confident to report is a good reflection that their cases are being taken seriously."

However, Linda Regan, a trustee of a new rape crisis centre due to open in Devon later this year said: "The encouraging of reporting has had an impact. I still don't think that there is any evidence to suggest that the vast majority of rape and sexual assaults are being reported to the police."

A victim of rape told the BBC: "I feel that the court process, giving evidence, is very difficult for women. It is absolutely weighted against women."

### **Myanmar military uses rape as weapon of war, group claimed**

A women's organisation has accused the Myanmar military of using sexual violence in their offensive against ethnic Kachin separatists in the north of the country.

Kachin Women's Association Thailand (KWAT) said soldiers gang-raped at least 18 women and girls, the youngest 15-year-old and the oldest around 50-year-old, between June 10 and June 18 during the advance of Myanmar's army towards the strongholds of the Kachin Independence Army (KIA).

KWAT also said that four women, including a grandmother, were killed after being raped while another died from injuries during rape.

Shirley Seng, spokeswoman of the organisation said: "The rapes were deliberate. When the soldiers from Myanmar army are moving, they set fire and destroy (the villages), kill and force villagers as porters, and rape the women. They are tormenting the public who happen to be living along the military route."

A statement by the organisation calls upon the regime to immediately stop using rape as a weapon of war, end the offensive against ethnic groups and withdraw from the ethnic areas.

### **Woman held hostage for 14 years in Saudi Arabia**

In the latest case of abuse of domestic workers in the country, authorities discovered a Sri Lankan woman who had been kept against her will without pay for nearly 14 years by her employers.

Family members of the woman said they had not heard from her for so many years and thought she was dead. Her husband said: "I am very happy to know that she is living and we want her back home as quickly as possible."

The discovery comes amid a case involving an Indonesian woman who was beheaded for murdering her Saudi employer's wife. Ruyati Binti Sapubi, 54, who was abused, was convicted of the murder and executed with a sword in Mecca. She is the second Indonesian domestic worker to have been executed in Saudi Arabia since 2008.

John Monterona, Middle East coordinator for campaign group Migrant International, condemning the execution said: "We are against all capital punishment and we are calling for rehabilitative measures and not execution by sword."

Campaigners say there is widespread sexual and physical abuse, conditions close to slavery. In a recent incident, a Sri Lankan woman had nails hammered into her legs, hands and forehead.

There are more than 100 expatriates awaiting execution in Saudi Arabia. They include 12 from the Philippines and 24 from Indonesia and some Indians, Pakistanis and Bangladeshis, mainly domestic workers.

More than a thousand migrant workers remain in prison in Saudi Arabia for crimes such as possession of alcohol, gambling or sex.

### **One third of bank directors should be women, says the EU**

If a draft European Union directive becomes law, European banks will have to ensure one-third of their directors are women.

Michel Barnier, Europe's internal markets commissioner, said the introduction of mandatory quotas would improve corporate governance.

He said: "We need to break the group-think approach, which has been far too prevalent in the past, with the disastrous consequences we have all witnessed."

The proposal, known as CRD4, is currently circulating, with a final version to be published in three weeks time.

If passed by the European Parliament its implementation by member states could take a year.
